#### **Context Statement**



# Performance Summary NAPLAN Proficiency



### **Attendance Comment**


In South Australia, preschool attendance is not compulsory, but it is strongly encouraged. Preschool gives children the best opportunity to develop skills, which prepare them for school. These benefits include establishing positive routines and habits, friendships and connections as well as developing communication, problem-solving and creative skills. All children are entitled to access a preschool program over 4 terms the year before they start school.

In South Australia, all children and young people must be in school from 6 years to 16 years old. They must attend a government or non-government school full time. From age 16 to 17 however, young people must attend school or an approved learning program (such as an apprenticeship, traineeship, accredited course or university). Schools and parents must encourage and support students to come to school every day. Parents and caregivers must make sure their child is enrolled in a school, and attends school all day and everyday it is open, unless a child is sick or has an approved exemption. Teachers and leaders actively follow up when a student misses school, including recording all absences and non-attendance. All schools in South Australia have local attendance procedures governed under the Education and Children's Services Regulations 2020.


#### Proportion of agree/strongly agree responses (%)

## Support of Learning


#### Proportion of agree/strongly agree responses (%)

### Relationships and Communication


#### Proportion of agree/strongly agree responses (%)

### Leadership and Decision Making


#### Proportion of agree/strongly agree responses (%)

#### **Governing Council Report 2023**

The school year began with an acquaintance breakfast with the community followed by open classrooms. Grand friend's Day was once again well received with great attendance by our wider school community. We were pleased to have a visit from our Chief Executive Officer, Professor Martin Westwell, who spoke with small groups of students, visited classrooms and witnessed quality teaching and learning in action. He had a site tour led by our school leaders, whom were very proud of our school.

With respect to infrastructure, we were successful in a grant application under the Schools Upgrade Fund for an amount of \$10,000. These funds are contributing to a garden upgrade which will be inclusive of a bush tucker garden. Completion in 2024 means that will be using the produce to support healthy lunches and share with community. Confirmation was received to proceed with the tender process for the repair of building 6. These works should be completed in the 2024 school year.

Clean up Australia Day was held with school community again and we were pleased that we could notice a reduction in the amount of rubbish we removed from the gully. This is supporting our environmental education and outdoor classroom at the gully. The principal shared the success of this learning with the wider community in an ABC radio interview.

Support was provided to families and students through Centacare, Murray Bridge. They delivered the 100% you Program for our reception and year 1 students to support their confidence and identity. They were also able to supporting families through 1:1 counselling.

Fundraising has been successful this year with Governing Council Members supporting the catering for the Mid Murray Council Volunteer's Reception, raising valuable funds for the school. Cadell Training Centre have also continued to support our school community with our recycling collections, which raised \$2254 throughout the year. These funds were used to subsidise the cost of camp to our local environment at Scotts Creek, Prince Alfred College. The camp was inclusive of Preschool to Year 6 with Year 2 to 6 involved in the overnight stay.

The SRC and student group decided to raise funds for Childhood Cancer and hosted a Colour Run. This was a rewarding experience for the students to donate to such a worthy cause an amount of \$1640. Appreciation was shared with all students and community at an assembly to thank them for participation in the event. We were also pleased that our students received a donation from Good 360. \$1400 worth of Lego was provided at a small cost which was covered by Waikerie School's Ministries Group. The lego has been used for lunch time activities to support wellbeing, communication, problem solving and social skills.

School organised events such as acknowledgement of Sorry Day, Reconciliation and Naidoc week. Students from preschool to year 6 performed to parents and friends at an assembly by singing, *From Little Things Big Things Grow*. Jam Band music performers attended our school and entertained the students and staff with a morning of song and dance. Other learning opportunities enjoyed by students over the year that were delivered on site were a visit from the team at Life Ed and Bus Safety SA. The local high school bus and driver also attended to support our Year 6 students as they transition to high school and use the bus service every day.

Sporting School Grants applied for over the year were successful and students participated in Athletics, Tennis and Football across three terms. We had success at SAPSASA at a local level and then 2 students competed in SAPSASA athletics in Adelaide to represent the Riverland Team, with one Year 6 student then being selected to compete at the SAPSASA Nationals in Tasmania. As a whole community we were very proud of his achievements, with him placing 12<sup>th</sup> in shotput.

School staff has attended professional learning throughout the course of the year which resulted in growth for our learners in Naplan, PAT testing and Brightpath. Teachers worked collaboratively with our partnership schools on student free days to improve explicit teaching of information report writing and reviewed reading data. A day of hands on learning and practical activities to support Maths problem solving and reasoning delivered by Mathematical Association of South Australia with local area Primary schools, supported the actions towards our Site Improvement Goal in Maths. Professional Learning to support the Instructional Phonics Routine and spelling took place in Term 4 to inform the whole school approach to follow the DfE scope and sequence in 2024.

Preschool staff and the principal attended two student free days to engage in professional learning delivered by Early childhood Consultant David Gilkes with Portfolio Colleagues to support the strategies of sustained shared thinking, designing curriculum, stretching thinking, researching together.

Principal, Carol Colbert, commenced consultation with community and sought Governing Council approval to begin the trial in Term 1 2024 for a Pre entry Preschool Community Care program the purpose being to reach out to community and provide 3 year old children the opportunity to start transitioning into the preschool setting.

Successful in application with the National Wellbeing School Program and appointment of a Wellbeing Officer who will be on site for 5 days a week will be a great benefit to the school community. I appreciate the commitment by members of the governing council for their continuous support and volunteering their time for the school community.
